This is a summary of how our school delivers music education to all our pupils across three areas – curriculum music, co-curricular provision and musical experiences – and what changes we are planning in future years. This information is to help pupils and parents or carers understand what our school offers and who we work with to support our pupils' music education.

Time allocated per week for curriculum music

The National Plan for Music Education (NPME) recommend that schools timetable at least one hour each week of the school year for music throughout Key Stages 1 and 2.

We currently timetable:

- Key Stage 1 – 1 hour minimum per week
- Key Stage 2 - 1 hour minimum per week

Music curriculum

- Our music curriculum is informed by the [model music curriculum](#) (March 2021), non-statutory guidance for teaching music from Key Stages 1 to 2 and the Music National Curriculum.

Opportunities for pupils during lesson time

As a school, we provide the following opportunities for pupils to learn to sing or play an instrument during lesson time:

- A weekly 45 – 60-minute lesson where the pupils have the opportunity to listen to and appraise music, develop their singing skills, learn tuned and untuned instruments and to improvise and compose using these.
- Within the Spanish curriculum children in KS2 learn and sing Spanish songs linked to the unit.
- Within the maths curriculum children in EYFS and KS1 learn and sing number and counting songs.

Partnerships

Hull Music Hub support our music curriculum in the following ways:

- Year 4 whole class ensemble teaching using glockenspiels
- Provide access for Charanga to support music lessons
- Organise events for us to showcase our music
- Provide training
- Instrumental learning opportunities for children in KS2

Part B: Extra-curricular music

This is about opportunities for pupils to sing and play music, outside of lesson time, including choirs, ensembles, and bands, and how pupils can make progress in music beyond the core curriculum.

Music outside of lesson time

Pupils can make progress in music outside of lesson time in the following ways:

- Instrument loans – children borrow glockenspiels and violins needed for lessons outside of curriculum time
- Weekly phase music assemblies – in phases children learn age appropriate songs including a range of chants, call and response songs, rounds, etc and a range of musicianship activities
- Weekly whole school assemblies – children learn to sing seasonal songs including traditional hymns and carols
- Assembly music – children listen to a wide variety of music from across history and cultures and learn about the artists that perform them

Part C: Musical events

This is about all the other musical events and opportunities that we organise, such as singing in assembly, concerts and shows, and trips to professional concerts.
